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
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A message from the CEO:

In 1930, our organisation first operated as a general vet clinic on Flemington Rd in Parkville during its embryonic phase. A simple setup featured a table on the veranda, staffed by a vet surgeon. Across the courtyard, a dispenser provided prescribed medicine and comforting advice for pet owners. Among the medicine bottles were a large jar of free dog biscuits and another of oatmeal biscuits marked "For Hungry Children."

This scene mirrored the economic struggles of the 1930s and highlighted Lort Smith's deep roots in compassion for the most vulnerable.



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

Get to know one of the many friendly faces behind the scenes here at Lort Smith, Dr Kassandra.

Q: How long have you been a part of the Lort Smith team?

Dr Kassandra: I've been with Lort Smith for five years. I spent the first three years as an Animal Welfare Officer at the Shelter while I studied to become a vet, and for the last two years, I've been working as a vet at our North Melbourne facility.

Pet therapy youth program:

A beacon of hope

Last November, Lort Smith celebrated the completion of the 'Pet Therapy for At-Risk Young People' project, a ground-breaking initiative funded by generous donors.

This program has had a significant impact on hundreds of at-risk young people aged 14 to 25 in youth detention and in the community.

Dedicated volunteers with their specially assessed dogs provided a unique form of support, fostering a sense of safety, calm, and stability. These interactions helped young people develop more self-awareness, engage positively with others, and build effective relationships with service staff. They also practised care, empathy, and other pro-social skills essential for their rehabilitation, leading to improved participation in educational and therapeutic activities.

Elisa Stannard, Lort Smith's Pet Therapy Youth Programs Coordinator, highlighted the impact: "Pet Therapy dogs provide a catalyst for rapid and profound connection. When young people are in crisis, dogs have a unique power to reach them that some other more traditional interventional therapies can't. With a dog by their side, young people feel empowered to voice their needs and connect with others."

One young participant shared, "Pet Therapy made my true colours come out." Service staff noted, "The Pet Therapy dog's presence pulls our young people out of their own heads and insecurities, helping them to attempt tasks and conversations that they wouldn't otherwise."

With 25 dedicated Pet Therapy volunteers and their dogs, the program recorded 1,652 interactions with at-risk young people aged 10-24. The success of this project highlights our commitment to community. partnership, and progressive programming for social impact.

Luna's lucky escape

A sweet cat named Luna found herself in a prickly situation after accidentally swallowing a sewing needle. Luna, a cheeky domestic medium hair cat, was brought to the Accident and Emergency department at Lort Smith, where her anxious owners sought urgent help.

The situation seemed dire, but Lort Smith's experienced accident and emergency team, led by Dr Tristan Rich, were ready to face this needle-in-a-haystack dilemma head-on.

Luna's X-ray was astounding.

It clearly showed the sewing needle, still threaded with wool, lodged in the cat's stomach. The stakes were high, but Dr Tristan, armed with skill and a steady hand, opted for an endoscope to retrieve the needle. "It's always good to get things like that out with the scope rather than doing invasive surgery," said Dr Tristan.

"Less pain, quick recovery, no chance of post-op complications, and lower costs."

The procedure, although delicate, went smoothly. Dr Tristan initially couldn't see the needle directly. as it was tangled in a furball. With patience and precision, he removed the furball and discovered the needle nestled inside. "I often use the endoscope to retrieve foreign bodies. Once you develop the skill, it makes for a very straight forward and quick process," he said.

Thanks to your support and Dr Tristan's expertise, Luna was saved from a potentially dangerous surgery. She was back on her paws in no time, much to her family's relief.
